## This Sunday's Gospel: John 10:11-18

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away — and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father



knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

# **Messy Church!**

In the old days at a community newspaper, local clubs and organizations submitted reports of their activities for publication, often concluding with the sentence "A good time was had by all." Almost always, the editors, unable to confirm the veracity of the statement, would take it out.

On Saturday, we held the fourth session of Messy Church, where, we are almost certain, a good time was held by all. This month's theme, close to Earth Day, was *Caring for God's Creation*, and the theme was reflected in the activities, table decorations, music and worship.

Participants planted seeds in egg cartons to take home and watch grow. Butterfly houses took shape as young people – and some not so young – hammered nails into wood. Budding artists decorated reusable cloth bags, and boxes for recycling. Plastic scraps became bright flowers, decorated with appropriate creation sayings and "planted" in the gardens outside the church where they are visible to passersby. A games room offered more energetic activities, with a God's creation twist on old favorites.

During the worship/celebration in the Holder Chapel, the group joined their voices in song, and compiled an impressive list of ways they could help protect God's creation. They heard two priests, one living in 2024 and the other in 2124, communicating through a temporary hole in the space-time continuum and sharing their perspectives on the way we treat the Earth today, and the effect our action – or inaction – will have on those who will follow. Entertaining? Yes. Funny? Yes. Thought-provoking? Absolutely.

Messy Church holds up five fundamental values. We shared intergenerational, Christ-centered, and creative activities; we celebrated in worship together. And hospitality! Pizza and makeyour-own sundaes!

In the background, Louis Armstong played *What a Wonderful World*, as people perused a collection of library books and took home Earth-shaped cards imbedded with seeds for planting.

Forty people showed up. A good time was had by all!

## **New England Voices in Harmony**


New England Voices in Harmony, a Nashua-based women's a cappella chorus, to which church

Meals Matter is committed to eliminating food insecurity in the Nashua School District. The program provides financial support for students who struggle with school lunch debt, whether they are free, reduced or full-pay students. Last year, six students rappelled off the building and raised \$5,000. This year they have a team of six students and a team of six adults. United Way is the fiscal agent, but all funds raised go directly to the Meals Matter program.

# **Meet our Outreach recipients**

Church of Our Saviour's outreach grants traditionally are made possible thanks to our various fundraisers and in-gatherings, Charitable Trust grants, designated gifts, and allocations by the vestry to outreach from Christmas Fair proceeds and year-end surpluses.

Your Outreach Committee thought parishioners would find it interesting to learn more about recipients of our outreach grants. You no doubt know that SHARE is a long-standing beneficiary, but do you know that there are more than 10 other worthy charities we support as we seek to extend God's love to those in need? In the coming months, we'll briefly highlight a different recipient each week.

**Dismas Home** of New Hampshire is a Manchester non-profit which we support annually. Their motto is "A Second Chance at Life." Dismas Home is a women's residential recovery home with a family-like environment serving NH women "who need additional resources and strategies after involvement in the justice system in order to restore their sense of security and develop new skills to build better lives for themselves and their children." Their two-phase strategy includes:

- An initial 90-day program "designed to treat the trauma behind the substance misuse and restore their physical, emotional and mental health," followed by
- A transitional living program combining "workforce education, life skills, ongoing therapeutic support and case management to prepare them for the next step in independent living".

# SHARE's food donations 'down to a trickle'

Please continue to keep SHARE in mind each week as you shop. Right now, their food donations are down to a trickle says Executive Director Chris Janson, and they are having to purchase food to provide groceries to their more than 100 clients each week.



In response, Outreach has re-started the "reverse offering" where slips of paper with a category of item needed by SHARE are handed out with the Sunday bulletin; you bring that item in the next time you're at church.

In the meantime, please consider donating the following items:

- Meat and proteins: Beef stew, chicken stew, chili, tuna, lentil soup, peanut butter, nutritional drinks for seniors (e.g. Ensure)
- Dried goods and canned goods: All canned fruits and vegetables, pastas and pasta sauce, canned and bottled juices, macaroni and cheese, dried beans and peas, rice,

breakfast cereals and oatmeal, bread, tortillas, crackers, soups, flour, sugar, cooking oils

- Dairy: Powdered and canned milk (unsweetened)
- Healthy snacks
- Baby items: Baby foods
- Dog and cat food

Leave these items in the basket in the church narthex, take items directly to SHARE (1 Columbus Ave., Milford, Monday through Friday, 8:30-4:30), leave them in barrels at Shaw's or Market Basket in Milford, or Bar Harbor Bank & Trust (32 Elm St., Milford), or donate online via their <u>Amazon Wishlist</u>.

Thank you for your ongoing support to this vital community organization providing food, clothing and emergency financial assistance to area families in need.
