From our Priest-in-Charge

“All mine are yours, and yours are mine.” *John 17:10*

This verse from Sunday’s Gospel reading records the Lord Jesus Christ praying to the Father about his disciples – those who believe that Jesus came from God the Father. That includes us, who love and follow Jesus, no matter how falteringly! Notice with me, the profound sense of belonging this verse implies. We ‘belong’ to Jesus; He says we are ‘mine.’ He says that we also belong to the Father! While the Holy Spirit is not in view in these words, He is surely fully involved, especially as Jesus soon after asks the Father to “sanctify” us – the particular work of the Holy Spirit.

I hope that you know deeply, or have some sense, that you belong to God. How does that feel? My youth group leader, Curate Alan Neale, instructed me that “facts are most important, and the feelings follow from the facts.” Sometimes we can feel adrift in life, and even doubt who we are, or whose we are. If that ever describes you, then dwell on the Gospel fact that you belong to God, the Good Shepherd who cares for all the sheep – the 99 safe in the fold, and the one that wanders off.

Since I, along with Michael, became your priest, I have started an act of recognizing this belonging, by always having a bowl of water in the font, which is strategically placed by the entrance to the church so that we pass it each time we enter the Nave. This affords the opportunity to touch a finger into the water and mark a cross on our foreheads, an enacted prayer to remind ourselves of our baptism and the deep sense of belonging this provides for us.

I am teaching my grandchildren to do this and to say "I belong to God" or "I belong to Jesus" when they do so, because I want them to know it. I do it myself, with that same affirmation of belonging, because I need to know it. Even when I don't need to be reminded, it reminds me of this beautiful truth. In easy days, or rough days the fact remains the same. This simple act of devotion helps me to apprehend it. We belong to God. Amen.

This Sunday's Gospel: **John 15:26-27; 16:4b-15**

Jesus said to his disciples, "When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf. You also are to testify because you have been with me from the beginning.

"I did not say these things to you from the beginning, because I was with you. But now I am going to him who sent me; yet none of you asks me, 'Where are you going?' But because I have said these things to you, sorrow has filled your hearts. Nevertheless I tell you the truth: it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. And when he comes, he will prove the world wrong about sin and righteousness and judgment: about sin, because they do not believe in me; about righteousness, because I am going to the Father and you will see me no longer; about judgment, because the ruler of this world has been condemned.

"I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you.




chances.”


